Therefore, this diversification plays a significant role in not only stabilizing the global economy but also supporting environmental sustainability and meeting more ambitious climate commitments. (Gelvin, 2020; Nye, 2011).

Third, Strengthening Global Anti-Terrorism Capacity. International cooperation in intelligence sharing and strengthening counter-terrorism operations can mitigate terrorist threats originating from the Middle East. This step, including deradicalization programs, is crucial in addressing terrorist groups such as ISIS and Al-Qaeda. Strengthening global anti-terrorism capacity requires a comprehensive and sustained approach. In addition to intelli-

gence sharing among countries, it is essential to enhance operational capabilities to track and respond to terrorist activities across various regions. Military cooperation and law enforcement collaboration between countries can create a more efficient system to prevent terrorist attacks before they occur. Furthermore, deradicalization programs focused on rehabilitating individuals exposed to radical ideologies are critical in preventing the regeneration of terrorist groups. For instance, strengthening educational systems and creating job opportunities in areas vulnerable to radicalization can help prevent further radicalization, making these programs an integral part of the long-term strategy to address global terrorism threats. (Baylis et al., 2020; Lister, 2015).

Fourth, Support for Economic and Social Development. Economic and social development programs in countries such as Iraq, Syria, and Yemen are essential to address the driving factors of radicalization, such as poverty and injustice. Improving well-being will contribute to long-term stability. Economic and social development in conflict-affected countries like Iraq, Syria, and Yemen is crucial for breaking the cycles of radicalization and instability. Investment in infrastructure, education, healthcare, and job opportunities will have a long-term impact on regional stability. By creating better conditions for communities, including equitable access to resources and public services, frustration—often a driver of radicalization—can be minimized. Furthermore, inclusive development programs help strengthen inter-community relationships, reduce social segregation, and promote tolerance among different ethnic and religious groups. This approach focuses not only on short-term humanitarian assistance but also on structural transformations that enable communities to become self-sufficient and contribute to sustainable economic development, thereby preventing the emergence of extremist groups in the future. (Acharya & Buzan, 2019; Harpviken & Tadjbakhsh, 2016).

Fifth, Addressing the Refugee Crisis with a Sustainable Approach. Addressing the refugee crisis in the Middle East requires a sustainable approach supported by the international community. Host countries, such as Turkey and Lebanon, need assistance to adequately accommodate and meet the needs of refugees. Handling the refugee crisis in the Middle East must go beyond mere emergency responses; long-term sustainable strategies are needed. Host countries like Turkey, Lebanon, and Jordan, which are home to millions of refugees, often face significant challenges in providing basic necessities such as housing, education, healthcare, and job opportunities. To alleviate this burden, the international community must provide ongoing financial support and technical assistance, including access to development funds, as well as strengthening local infrastructure in refugee-hosting countries. Additionally, efforts to create political solutions to the conflicts causing displacement should continue to be encouraged, enabling refugees to return safely and with dignity to their home countries. Social and economic integration of refugees in host countries should also be prioritized, with programs that allow them to positively contribute to the local economy, thus reducing social tensions between refugees and local residents. (Phillips, 2016; Malley, 2015).

Sixth, Strengthening Regional Cooperation for Security Stability. Cooperation among Middle Eastern countries, such as Saudi Arabia and Iran, is essential to reduce destructive rivalries and focus on joint efforts against common threats such as terrorism and the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction. Strengthening regional cooperation in the Middle East is not only important for alleviating tensions between countries like Saudi Arabia and Iran but also for building a solid foundation for long-term stability in the region. In the context of common threats such as terrorism and the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction, countries in the region need to develop collaborative mechanisms that allow for information and intelligence sharing, as well as joint operations to effectively address these threats. This approach may involve organizing security dialogues that include all key actors in the Middle East, including those countries that often have disputes, to reach agreements on mutual security principles. Additionally, cooperation in economic, social, and cultural fields can help reduce misunderstandings and build trust among nations, creating a more conducive climate for dialogue and conflict resolution in the future. By focusing on shared interests, Middle Eastern countries can move from prolonged cycles of conflict to an era of greater stability and sustainable development. (Sadowski, 1998; Seale, 1988).

Lastly, Commitment to Strengthening International Law and Human Rights. Enforcing international law and protecting human rights in the Middle East is a crucial element in resolving conflicts peacefully. The involvement of the International Criminal Court (ICC) can help expedite the resolution process and curb human rights violations during ongoing conflicts. In addition to the involvement of the ICC, collaboration between Middle Eastern countries and international organizations is also essential to reinforce the enforcement of international law and the protection of human rights. Through training programs and technical support, countries can enhance their legal institutions' capacity to effectively and transparently address human rights violations. Furthermore, binding international agreements must be signed and implemented by countries in the region to guarantee commitment to human rights principles and civilian protection. The development of independent reports on the human rights situation in conflict areas can also help monitor progress and encourage accountability for those involved. By combining the enforcement of international law with a community-based approach, where individuals and civil groups are engaged in the recovery process, it is more likely that societies that respect law and human rights will emerge, ultimately supporting more peaceful and sustainable conflict resolution. (Stern & Berger, 2015; Pollack, 2019).

5. Conclusion

The conclusion of the discussion regarding the transformation of global security dynamics due to conflicts in the Middle East shows that this region remains the center of instability that affects global security. The ongoing conflicts in various countries in the Middle East have not only created a

major humanitarian crisis, but also encouraged the proliferation of terrorism, which poses a serious threat to global stability. Terrorist groups such as ISIS and Al-Qaeda have exploited power vacuums and political instability to expand their influence, requiring a coordinated and sustained international response to address this threat. Economic instability caused by conflict in the Middle East has also had a far-reaching impact on the global economy, particularly through oil price fluctuations and investment uncertainty. Major countries and international organizations must work together to diversify energy sources and strengthen global energy security. These efforts, along with a more holistic approach that includes economic and social development in the region, are critical to reducing the negative impacts of economic instability and creating a more stable and prosperous environment.

Changes in the foreign policies of major countries such as the United States, the European Union and Russia reflect their adaptation to the new dynamics emerging from conflicts in the Middle East. A more flexible and multilateral approach, as well as increased international cooperation, are key to addressing the region's growing complexity and challenges. Effective policies must include a comprehensive and coordinated strategy, involving military, diplomatic, economic and humanitarian dimensions to achieve the long-term goals of stability and security in the Middle East. By understanding the impact of conflict in the Middle East on global security, this research provides insight into how these challenges can be addressed through comprehensive and coherent policies. Recommendations resulting from this research include the need for a multilateral approach to conflict resolution, the importance of diversifying energy sources, and the need for a coordinated humanitarian response to address the refugee crisis. Through a better understanding of regional conflict dynamics, the international community can work together to create a more peaceful and stable environment in the Middle East and around the world.

Finally, geopolitical dynamics in the Middle East demonstrate a complex interaction between national interests, regional alliances, and international intervention. Rivalries between regional powers such as Saudi Arabia and Iran, Russia's military presence, Turkey's geopolitical ambitions, and the changing foreign policy strategies of the United States and the European Union have all contributed to an increasingly complex and unstable geopolitical landscape. Understanding these dynamics is key for the international community in formulating effective policies to promote peace and stability in the Middle East and, ultimately, ensure global security.
