



Research on the Application of Emotional Narrative in Humanities to Jewelry Design under the Guidance of Art Design

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Abstract. In the current context where jewelry design is facing a homogenization dilemma and consumers' demands for emotional and cultural connotations are increasing, this research aims to explore the application of emotional narrative in humanities to jewelry design under the guidance of art design. Through theoretical analysis, case studies, and multi - dimensional exploration of application methods, it is found that emotional narratives can be expressed through multiple themes such as personal, cultural, and social aspects. They can be integrated into jewelry design by means of design elements like materials, colors, and shapes, as well as various narrative structures, which innovates design concepts, methods, and styles. The research conclusion indicates that there is great potential in the integration of emotional narratives in humanities and jewelry design, providing a new direction for the development of the industry. In the future, interdisciplinary research should be further deepened to promote the jewelry design industry to a higher level.

1 Introduction

In the era of globalization and the convergence of diverse cultures, jewelry design is no longer confined to its simple decorative function. Consumers increasingly desire jewelry that can carry profound emotions and unique cultural connotations. The rich emotional narratives contained in the humanities open up a brand - new development path for jewelry design. This study focuses on the application of emotional narratives in humanities to jewelry design under the guidance of art design, aiming to analyze the innovative models of their integration and explore their unique value and far - reaching significance in the contemporary design context.

2 Theoretical Analysis of Emotional Narrative in Humanities and Jewelry Design

2.1 Theoretical Foundation of Emotional Narrative in Humanities

Emotional narrative in humanities is a systematic expression of human emotions, values, and cultural memories through carriers such as stories, symbols, and images. The updating of teaching philosophies in art and design education serves as the foundation for the reform of art and design instruction in higher education institutions[1]. In art fields like literature, film, and drama, emotional narrative is a crucial means of evoking audience resonance and conveying core ideas. For example, a classic literary work often immerses readers in its world with its ups and downs of the plot and delicate emotional descriptions, enabling them to deeply feel the glory of human nature and the spirit of the times conveyed by the work. This narrative method can transcend cultural and temporal - spatial limitations, touch the common emotional nerves of humanity, and has a powerful appeal and influence.

2.2 Development and Current Situation of Jewelry Design

Jewelry design has a long history, evolving from simple bone and stone ornaments in primitive society to the dazzling array of jewelry in modern times, which is closely linked to the development of human civilization. Early jewelry was mostly related to religious and totem worship, with a strong sense of mystery and symbolism. With the progress of the times, jewelry design has gradually moved towards diversification and personalization, emphasizing material innovation, exquisite craftsmanship, and aesthetic expression. In recent years, the continuous rise in gold prices has compelled designers to explore a wider range of materials: "Silver, K gold, and platinum have long been standard choices, but lighter materials like titanium and aluminum allow designers to create more exaggerated silhouettes without worrying about burdening the wearer[2]." However, in the pursuit of commercial value and fashion trends, some jewelry designs have fallen into a homogenization trap, lacking in - depth emotional connotations and cultural heritage, and it is difficult to meet the growing spiritual needs of consumers.

2.3 Feasibility and Significance of the Integration of the Two

Interdisciplinarity refers to the characteristic of knowledge being distributed and diffused across various disciplines in research, primarily measured by the diversity of disciplines involved in knowledge units such as papers, scholars, and institutions[3]. The integration of emotional narrative in humanities and jewelry design has inherent feasibility. Jewelry, as a portable art carrier, has the potential to carry complex emotions and stories. Incorporating emotional narratives into jewelry design can endow jewelry with vivid vitality, transforming it from a cold object into a communicator of emotions and cultures. Chen Pingyuan previously articulated in his writings that the focus of literary education should shift from the imparting of specific knowledge to the

cultivation of questioning, analysis, critique, and reconstruction[4]. This integration can not only meet consumers' demands for personalized and emotional jewelry, enhance the added value and market competitiveness of jewelry, but also inject new vitality into the field of jewelry design, promoting the innovative development of design concepts and methods, and facilitating the application and inheritance of the humanities in artistic practices.

3 Application Methods and Case Analyses of Emotional Narrative in Jewelry Design

3.1 Selection and Expression of Emotional Themes

3.1.1 Personal Emotional Narrative.

Many designers draw inspiration from their own life experiences and create jewelry works with strong personal emotional imprints. For example, Designer Li recalled the warm moments spent with his grandmother in childhood and designed a necklace inspired by the knitting texture of his grandmother's sweater. The necklace is made of soft metal wire, imitating the knitting stitches to create a unique texture. The pendant part is a photo of his grandmother when she was young, inlaid in an exquisite metal frame. This necklace not only carries Designer Li's deep longing for his grandmother but also allows the wearer to feel the warmth of family affection across time and space.

3.1.2 Cultural Emotional Narrative.

Regional and traditional cultures are rich sources of emotional narratives. Taking traditional Chinese auspicious patterns as an example, patterns such as the dragon and phoenix bringing prosperity and having more than enough every year contain profound cultural implications and good wishes. Designer Wang used 3D printing technology to modernize the dragon and phoenix patterns and skillfully integrated the metal - shaped dragon and phoenix into earring design. The details of the dragon's body and the phoenix's feathers are vivid, retaining the charm of traditional patterns while presenting a stylish and novel design. Through this pair of earrings, the wearer can experience the unique charm of traditional Chinese culture and also become a carrier for cultural inheritance and dissemination[5].

3.1.3 Social Emotional Narrative.

Art and design are not merely visual representations; they are also vital vehicles for cultural innovation and heritage[6]. Jewelry designs that focus on social issues and the spirit of the times can trigger public reflection on social phenomena. For example, in the face of the increasingly severe environmental pollution problem, Designer Zhang designed a series of environmental - protection - themed jewelry with the theme of "Protect the Earth". One of the rings is made of recycled waste metal for the ring band, and the ring surface is inlaid with an "Earth" shape made from specially processed discarded plastic. This ring not only calls on people to pay attention to environmental

protection but also reflects the concept of sustainable development, arousing wide-spread social resonance.

3.2 Emotional Embodiment in Design Elements

3.2.1 Material Selection and Emotional Transmission.

Different materials have unique emotional attributes and symbolic meanings. Precious metals such as gold and silver are often regarded as symbols of wealth and nobility due to their rarity and luster. Gemstones such as diamonds, rubies, and sapphires represent different emotions and meanings respectively. Diamonds symbolize eternal love, rubies imply passion and vitality, and sapphires represent calmness and wisdom. Organic materials such as wood, leather, and shells give people a sense of nature, warmth, and closeness. When selecting materials, designers need to fully consider the emotional information conveyed by the materials to make them fit the design theme. For example, when designing a jewelry piece themed on motherly love, the designer chose warm pearls and soft leather. Pearls symbolize the tenderness and kindness of a mother, and leather conveys warmth and care(as shown in Table 1).

3.2.2 Color Application and Emotional Resonance.

Color psychology research shows that different colors can evoke different emotional responses in people. In jewelry design, the application of color is of great significance. Red usually represents passion, love, and courage. In Valentine's Day - themed jewelry design, the use of red gemstones or red metal accessories can enhance the emotional expression of the jewelry. Blue gives people a feeling of calmness, rationality, and profundity and is often used in business or high - end jewelry design to show the wearer's calm and elegant temperament. Green symbolizes nature, vitality, and hope and is widely used in environmental - protection - themed or nature - related jewelry designs. For example, a necklace themed on the forest uses green jadeite as the main gemstone, paired with brown wooden beads and silver leaf - shaped pendants. Through

the ingenious combination of colors, it creates a fresh and natural atmosphere, making the wearer feel as if they are in a thick forest.

3.2.3 Shape Design and Emotional Expression.

The shape design of jewelry can directly convey emotions and implications. Geometric shapes such as circles and squares have the characteristics of simplicity, stability, and order. A circle often symbolizes reunion and completeness, a square represents stability and rules, and a triangle gives people a sense of sharpness and movement. Natural forms such as flowers, animals, and plants are full of vitality and dynamic beauty. Jewelry in the shape of flowers often conveys romantic and elegant emotions, while animal - shaped jewelry can show vitality and personality. Designers can skillfully use geometric and natural forms for shape design according to the design theme. For example, for a brooch themed "Metamorphosis", the designer presented the moment when a butterfly breaks out of its cocoon in the form of a metal sculpture. The fluttering wings of the butterfly show the tenacity and beauty of life, conveying a positive and freedom - seeking emotional implication.

3.3 Construction of Narrative Structures in Jewelry Design

3.3.1 Linear Narrative.

Linear narrative is a way of telling a story that unfolds gradually in chronological order or according to the plot development. In jewelry design, designers can tell a complete story by designing a series of related jewelry works. For example, a designer designed a set of wedding jewelry for a newly - married couple, including an engagement ring, a wedding necklace, and an anniversary bracelet. The design inspiration of the engagement ring comes from the scene of the couple's first encounter, and the two small diamonds inlaid on the ring represent their first heartbeats. The wedding necklace is themed on the wedding ceremony, with the chain designed in the shape of a church arch and the pendant being the couple's wedding vows. Each bead on the anniversary bracelet records important moments in their married life, such as the birth of a child and travel experiences. Through this series of jewelry, the love story of the couple from acquaintance to mutual understanding and then to love is completely presented.

3.3.2 Non - linear Narrative.

Non - linear narrative breaks the traditional order of time and plot and constructs stories through fragmented, metaphorical, and symbolic means. This narrative method can stimulate the wearer's imagination and curiosity, allowing them to actively participate in the interpretation and construction of the story. For example, a designer designed a jewelry series named "Dream", which includes earrings, bracelets, and rings. The jewelry features abstract geometric shapes and irregular lines, with gemstones and pearls of different colors inlaid on the surface. Each piece of jewelry is like a fragment of a dream, and the wearer can combine these fragments into their own dream story according to their own understanding and feelings. This non - linear narrative design method endows the jewelry with more openness and fun.

3.3.3 Interactive Narrative.

Interactive narrative emphasizes the wearer's participation and experience. By designing jewelry with interactive functions, the wearer can interact with the jewelry, changing its shape, color, or function, and thus participating in the development and evolution of the story. For example, a designer designed an intelligent jewelry bracelet equipped with sensors and color - changing LED lights. When the wearer is in a happy mood, the bracelet will automatically change to a bright color and play relaxing music. When the wearer feels stressed or anxious, the bracelet will emit a soft light and remind the wearer to do breathing exercises and other relaxation practices. This jewelry bracelet can not only reflect the wearer's emotional state in real - time but also provide emotional support and care to the wearer through interaction, strengthening the emotional connection between the wearer and the jewelry(as shown in Table 2).

For example, they can draw on the emotional analysis methods in psychology to deeply understand consumers' emotional needs and preferences. They can also use advanced technologies such as computer - aided design and 3D printing to achieve more complex and refined emotional narrative expressions. In addition, by combining the latest research results in materials science, new materials can be developed to provide more possibilities for emotional narrative.

4.3 Diversification of Design Styles

The richness of emotional narratives determines the diversification of jewelry design styles. Designers can create distinctive design styles according to different emotional themes, cultural backgrounds, and narrative methods. From traditional classic styles to modern minimalist styles, from ethnic - style designs to future - tech styles, various styles blend and collide, bringing a more diverse range of choices to the jewelry design market and meeting the personalized needs of different consumers.

5 Conclusion

This research has deeply explored the application of emotional narrative in humanities to jewelry design under the guidance of art design.
