Foreword

Leonhard Euler was born on 15 April 1707 in Basel, Switzerland. Euler was the leading mathematician of the eighteenth century and one of the foremost mathematicians of all time. He made seminal contributions to many areas of pure and applied mathematics including differential and integral calculus, particle and rigid body mechanics, differential equations, graph theory, the calculus of variations and fluid mechanics. The major work "Principles Generaux du Movement des Fluids" in which Euler derived the equations of flow of an ideal fluid was published two hundred and fifty years ago in 1757.

In order to commemorate the Tercentenary of Euler's birth the Centre for Differential Equations, Continuum Mechanics and Applications at the University of the Witwatersrand held an Euler Tercentenary Workshop on 3 and 4 August 2007. The guest speaker at the Workshop was Professor George Bluman of the Department of Mathematics, University of British Colombia, Vancouver, Canada. This special issue of the Journal of Nonlinear Mathematical Physics consists of a selection of refereed papers presented at the Euler Tercentenary Workshop. The areas of research covered by the papers are all areas in which Euler worked: differential equations, conservation laws and fluid mechanics.
